Parent-Teacher Conferences

Hello Parents...As you know, Parent/Teacher Conferences are soon approaching. This year; conference days are scheduled for either **Monday, Nov. 21st, (5:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m.)** or on **Tuesday, Nov. 22nd, (9:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m.)**. You may have already set up a conference day and time with your child's classroom teacher.

At the November Parent/Teacher conference; you will also have the opportunity to meet and conference with your child's **Title I Teacher** during those days/times before, after or along with your child's classroom teacher. If you wish to know the **overall academic progress** of your child in Title I or need more information regarding the Title I program; Title I teachers will be available to speak with you.

Look for information coming home soon in your child's school take home folder letting you know when your schools Title I Teachers will be available. Your Title I Teachers are looking forward to meeting with you and sharing information regarding Title I and your child's Title I progress.

Tips for a Successful Parent Teacher Conference

Parent-teacher conferences present an excellent opportunity to find out how your child is adjusting to the new school year and to get to know his/her teachers.

Here are some general hints on how to have a successful conference.

- **Talk to Your Child** - Ask your child if there is anything that he would like you to discuss with the teacher.
- **Be Prepared** - Jot down everything that you want to talk about at the conference.
- **Be On Time** - Arrive promptly or a few minutes early.
- **Start Off on the Right Foot** - Begin with positive comments about the teacher or classroom.
- **Stay on Track** - Avoid lengthy discussions of topics that are not related to the purpose of the conference.
- **Listen to What the Teacher Has to Say** - Be open-minded to suggestions from the teacher.
- **Stay Calm** - Keep your emotions under control.
- **Tell Your Child What You Discussed** - Take notes about what has been discussed to share with your child.
- **Show Gratitude** - Express appreciation for the conference.




- **Contact the teacher** about any questions you didn't have time to ask.
- **Follow up.** If the teacher brings something to your attention that needs to be addressed with your child, take steps to put the plan in motion, whether it's helping with organizational skills, getting extra help, or addressing a social issue.
- **Update your child.** Start with the positive things his/her teacher had to say, then fill him/her in on any concerns you and the teacher discussed. Explain how you can all work together to ensure your child has a successful year.
- **Keep in touch.** Once an action plan is in place, try to determine how you'll follow up with the teacher in the weeks and months ahead. Will it be through written notes, a phone call, or another conference? And it's not a bad idea to inform your child that you're keeping in touch with their school. "When a child knows parents and teachers are regularly working together, the child will see that education is a high priority requiring commitment and effort," according to the National PTA.

Keep in mind you and your child's teacher has the same goal in mind: To help your child succeed in school.

Kids' Corner: Crafting for the HOLIDAY

Thankful Turkey Craft - (found on Pinterest)

It may be a tradition in your family to reflect on what you are thankful for during Thanksgiving time. This turkey kid craft is a great way to celebrate Thanksgiving and express those things for which you are thankful. Make this a family activity for extra fun.

Supplies:

- Brown card stock or construction paper
- Orange card stock or construction paper
- Multi-colors of card stock or construction paper
- Feathers
- Wiggle eyes
- Red Tissue paper
- Glue Stick
- Black Marker Pen



Instructions:

1. Trace a circle on brown paper using a Tupperware bowl or lid. Cut it out for the body of the turkey.
2. Choose 5 different colors of paper and make a template for feathers. Trace & cut-out the feathers.
3. Using a glue stick, glue the feathers on the back of the body by fanning out the feathers.
4. Write what you are thankful for on the feathers.
5. Cut out a triangle for the beak from the orange paper and glue on the body. Glue wiggly eyes to the body and a small piece of red tissue paper next to the beak for the gobbler/wattle.
6. Glue feathers to the back of the paper feathers.
