Our Mission

Established in 1998, the Kent City Schools Foundation was created to encourage and support academic excellence in the Kent Schools. The Foundation provides financial resources to support three important initiatives to assist Kent students and families.

- Awarding annual **SCHOLARSHIP(s)** for graduates of Theodore Roosevelt High School.
- Launching a **MINI GRANTS FUND** to support requests by teachers or principals for specific needs or projects, such as after-school tutoring opportunities, STEM science fairs and pilot programs. A primary focus will include instructional technology requests, such as iPod learning stations, iPads, Chromebooks and laptops, as well as apps, software and subscriptions.
- Supporting **PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT** for teachers, including inquiry-based learning, reading intervention and standards-based instruction.

About the Foundation

The Foundation is a non-profit 501(c)(3) charitable organization dedicated to supporting students in the Kent City Schools. Board members volunteer their time and talents to ensure that the Foundation is fiscally sound and financially responsible for all assets. Established in 1998, the Foundation raises funds and solicits contributions from the community, as well as graduates of Theodore Roosevelt High School.

About the Kent City Schools

Since 1860, the Kent City School district has been educating children and currently serves more than 3,300 students in four elementary buildings, one middle school and one high school. The district is comprised of the City of Kent, Franklin Township and the Villages of Brady Lake and Sugar Bush Knolls.

What makes the Kent Schools special?

- A diverse student body combines many backgrounds, talents and cultures.
- All-day kindergarten is available at no extra cost to every family in the district.
- A continuum of support is available for students with special needs, including the latest in technological aids for students.
- A character education program helps integrate positive character traits into the curriculum while addressing issues important to families and the community.
- All district buildings are fully wired for Internet, and networking. Schools have their own computer labs.
- Students at Theodore Roosevelt High School can choose from more than 200 courses including an extensive Career Technical Education curriculum, and participate in over 60 clubs and 17 sports.
- Stanton Middle School incorporates an interdisciplinary team teaching approach. Students learn from a group of teachers who collaborate on lesson plans and ideas.
- Elementary schools offer a diverse curriculum of reading, mathematics, English, spelling, handwriting, composition, computers, social studies, science, health, art, physical education and music. Special programs include visits from children's authors, distance learning, Right to Read Week, multicultural art and music programs.
